- Second Committee on autonomy formed in SFS College on 1.2.2017 with members Dr. H.G. Jahagirdar, Dr.V.P. Pradhan, Dr. S.B. Sarwe. Dr. J. Benjamin, Fr. Praveen D'Souza.
- Fr. Praveen D'Souza and Dr. Advait Bhagade were deputed for the State level meet organized by RUSA on Academic Autonomy at St. Xavier's College, Mumbai, held on 23.9.2016.
- Dr. Advait Bhagade gave a presentation on Autonomy to SFS College staff during staff meeting held on 25.10.2016.
- Dr. Jahagirdar gave a presentation on autonomy to SFS College staff on 4.3.2017.
- Dr. Om Mohodaya, Principal, J.B. Science College, Wardha, delivered a talk on autonomy on 7.4.17.
- Dr. Agnello Menezes, Principal, St. Xavier's College, Mumbai, delivered a talk to SFS College staff, interacted with IQAC, and interacted with management, on autonomy, on 24.4.17.
- Dr. K.T. Thomas, Principal, took opinion of SFS College staff on autonomy during staff meeting on 26.4.2017.

#### **Feedback Analysis**

#### **Student's Feedback**

#### 1. Curriculum:

#### Aspects:

Feedback was taken from the students covering important aspects such as syllabus, Course Content, Coverage of theory and Practical Classes, Library materials, availability of Reading materials, Internal Assessments, etc.

#### **Suggestions**:

- Starting of new courses focusing on employability
- Inclusion of sports in regular curriculum

#### **Analysis:**

- BCA and BCCA students find their syllabus challenging
- B.Sc. students were satisfied with their course content and completion.
- B.Sc. Students felt that Practical Examinations should be held by University before the theory examination for each semester.
- M.Sc. students found their syllabus challenging. They commented that reading material is not easily available.

#### **Action Taken:**

- Grievances and suggestions were communicated to staff who are members of University Boards of Study/ Task force for being taken up in appropriate forum.
- It was decided to increase the availability of reading material.

#### 2. Teaching learning Evaluation

#### Aspects:

Feedback was taken from the students about their teachers based on a scoring pattern covering important aspects such as knowledge base, presentation & communication skills, sincerity, punctuality, regularity, accessibility, interest, behavior with students, assignments & inculcation of value system. Also, a general feedback was collected about the facilities available in the College.

#### **Suggestions:**

- Students suggested improvement in teaching and language skills of teachers.
- Introducing open wi-fi in Library.
- Discontinuation of system of College Uniform
- Increase in the number of computers in the Network Resource Centre located in Library.
- Improved lighting and fans facility.

#### **Analysis:**

- Students demanded improvement in the teaching of some teachers.
- Students demanded better facilities in keeping with the changing ICT scenario.
- Some students were not satisfied with the system of College Uniform.
- Physical infrastructure such as lights and fans needed to be augmented.

#### **Action Taken:**

• Need for improvement was conveyed to the respective teachers during their interaction with the Principal. It was also decided to include teaching skills in the faculty improvement programmes.

• It was decided to continue with the Uniform system in order to have a feeling of uniformity and equality among the students and to prevent any discrimination. In addition, new uniforms were introduced for First year students to ensure better vigilance and care.

- It was decided to increase the ICT facilities available in a phased manner. Thought was also given to restricted access to wi-fi in College campus.
- Additional lights and fans were provided in class rooms as well as laboratories.

#### **Alumni Feed Back**

#### **Aspects:**

• Feedback was invited from alumni on aspects such as the importance of education imparted by the College in their career and development, development of the College, contribution towards development, faculty cooperation and communication by the College.

#### **Suggestions:**

- To hold career oriented activities to increase the employability skills..
- To conduct more subject-related activities.

#### **Analysis:**

- Alumni are interested in further development of the College.
- Effective communication of College matters to alumni is required.

#### **Action Taken:**

- Alumni were invited to hold activities related to personality development and employability enhancement.
- It was decided to update the website more frequently to reach out to more alumni.

#### **Best Practices**

#### Title of the practice: ORIENTATION OF NEW STUDENTS

#### Context that required the initiation of the practice:

- New students admitted to Undergraduate courses of the University are acquainted only with the Board pattern of study and examination.
- New students are admitted from diverse social and educational backgrounds.
- They are ignorant of the different facilities and the location where they can be availed in the College.
- At times, they experience difficulty or hesitate to fall in with the routine and system established by the College.
- Recently, the practice of orienting the students through conduct of a special orientation programme has therefore been initiated.

#### Objective of the practice:

- To familiarize students with the working of the College.
- To make them aware of facilities provided by the College.
- To let them know the DOs and DONTs while being students of the College.
- To acquaint the new students with the Semester pattern introduced recently by the University.
- To make them aware of the ATKT regulations as applicable before the introduction of the semester pattern, and modifications of the same in the current semester pattern.
- To introduce them to the system of Internal Assessment as envisaged by the University in the Semester system.

#### The practice:

- At the beginning of every academic session, newly admitted students are oriented through a presentation on the College.
- Orientation program includes
  - o Interaction with the Principal
  - o A presentation about the College campus and its facilities.
  - o A presentation in relation with the general examination pattern of the University.
  - o A presentation about the library, its facilities, its rules and regulations.

#### Obstacles faced if any, Strategies adopted to overcome them:

- Admissions of new students continue for about two months.
- Those who take late admission generally tend to miss the orientation.
- If the number of late admissions is considerable, orientation programme is repeated at the closure of admissions.

#### Impact of the practice:

- Students become aware of the facilities provided by the College.
- They feel confident to use the facilities.
