# **Parents:**

Feedback is taken by the Principal during interaction with parents.

Parents have expressed general satisfaction about:

- 1. Infrastructure facility
- 2. Conduct of regular classes
- 3. Continuous evaluation system.

Parents have made the following suggestions / grievances:-

1. To provide lunch break in B.Sc. timetable.

**Action Taken:** In order to maintain academic flexibility, there are numerous subject combinations at B. Sc. Level. Due to this, some students do not get a lunch break at an appointed time. Staff has been instructed to give 15 minutes break at around 1.00 pm if it is a practical block. Attempts are underway to restructure the time table in such a manner as to accommodate a uniform 20 minutes lunch break.

2. Public transport facility is not available for students to come to the college.

**Action Taken:** The College is attempting to resolve the issue by again approaching the public transport authorities to introduce bus service route which covers the College.

### **Students:**

A written feedback is obtained from students at the end of the academic session by the Principal. Students evaluate teachers on the basis of knowledge base, presentation and communication skills, sincerity, punctuality, regularity, accessibility/encourage, interest, behaviour with students, assignment quizzes, inculcation of value system. A general feedback on the students satisfaction with the College is also taken.

Students have expressed general satisfaction about:

- 1. Infrastructural facility
- 2. Overall performance of their teachers.

Students have made the following suggestions / grievances:-

1. Students need 3 books for minimum 10 days from library.

**Action Taken:** Librarian has been instructed to look into the matter and resolve the issue favourably.

2. Improvement of the College Canteen.

**Action Taken:** New College Canteen has been constructed and made operational.

3. Boys' toilet facility.

**Action Taken:** Construction partly completed. However, due to unavoidable circumstances, finishing of the block has been delayed. It shall be made operational in 2018-19.

4. Condition of approach road to parking.

**Action Taken:** Levelling and maintenance activity of road has been carried out.

5. Behaviour of Physics & Chemistry lab attendants.

**Action Taken:** The concerned HODs have been instruicted to take corrective measures to resolve the grievance. Principal also interacted with concerned Non teaching staff.

The Management, Principal and Staff are acting suitably by taking positive action on students feedback.
